SECTION 1

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1. GENERAL

AXION TECHNOLOTIES Ltd., has developed a new generation of high-performance Electronic Destination Signs based on the technology of High Intensity Light Emitting Diodes (LED). Our Electronic Destination Sign Systems (EDSS) are designed to increase satisfaction of the public transit users and to meet the particular needs and requirements of the Transit Sector such as the ADA regulations.

1.2. FEATURES

This section presents the features specific to each component of the EDSS.

1.2.1. CONTROL CONSOLE

The Control Console is the control unit (master) of the sign network. It is the interface between the user and the EDSS. It lets the operator select the route number and other messages to display. It also ensures the integrity of the communication link between all components of the system. An error indicator appears on the LCD in the event of a communication or component failure. The control console menus are used to configure the system and display some diagnostics.

1.2.2. DESTINATION SIGN

The design concept of our destination signs gives you the opportunity for various configurations. They are generally used to display messages such as the route number and destination including public interest message, "yield" message and emergency messages in a fixed or multiline mode. You also have the possibility to add special effects to your display such as:

- Horizontal and vertical scrolling
- Freezing a part of the screen
- Flashing
- Reverse video
- Pictograms.

The 40 series includes five basic types of signs.

1.2.2.1. The 8.5-inch Character Sign

The 8.5-inch character sign is the biggest, most versatile and most visible model of our line of products. It is used as a Front Sign on buses. It has multiple font sizes displayed in a proportional mode on one or several lines. It is generally used to display messages such as the route number and destination as well as public service announcements and emergency messages in a fixed or multiline mode. It can also display pictograms and has special effect capabilities such as reverse video, horizontal and vertical scrolling, flashing and more.

1.2.2.2. The 8-inch Character Sign

The 8-inch character sign is used essentially as a Front Sign on buses. The features and functionality are identical to those of the 8.5-inch character sign. It has multiple font sizes

displayed in a proportional mode on one or several lines. It is generally used to display messages such as the route number and destination as well as public service announcements and emergency messages in a fixed or multiline mode. It can also display pictograms and has special effect capabilities such as reverse video, horizontal and vertical scrolling, flashing, etc.

1.2.2.3. The 6-inch Character Sign

Smaller than the 8-inch character model, it is mainly used as a Rear Sign. However, it can be used as a Front Sign on vehicles with restricted space and as a Curb Side Sign. Just like the 8-inch character sign, it can display messages such as the route number and destination as well as public service announcements and emergency messages in a fixed or multiline mode. It can also display pictograms and has special effect capabilities such as reverse video, horizontal and vertical scrolling, flashing, etc.

1.2.2.4. The 4.5-inch Character Sign

Generally used as a Curb Side, a Rear Sign and/or a Key Number Sign, it can display up to two lines of alphanumeric characters at a time. It has multiple font sizes displayed in a proportional mode. Just like the previous models, it has the same features and functionality.

1.2.2.5. The 3.2-inch Character Sign

The smallest of our line of products, it is usually used as a Curb Side Sign. It displays one line of alphanumeric characters at a time. It also has multiple font sizes displayed in a proportional mode. Just like the biggest signs, the 3.2-inch character sign displays messages such as the route number and destination as well as public service announcements and emergency messages in a fixed or multiline mode. It can also display pictograms and has special effect capabilities such as reverse video, horizontal and vertical scrolling, flashing and more.

1.3. DATABASE TRANSFER

The database is programmed with a computer (IBM PC or compatible) using the "Data Transit" software developed and sold by AXION TECHNOLOGIES LTD. Each message is assigned a code the operator enters on the Control Console for the related information to be displayed.

1.3.1. DATA TRANSIT SOFTWARE

Data Transit is the software interface for the sign systems. It is used to manage the message database and prepare various messages to be displayed.

1.3.2. TRANSFER UNIT (TU)

The transfer of the database from the computer to the Control Console is performed using one of the following transfer methods:

1.4. DISTRESS SIGNAL

The distress signal option is a valuable safety feature. The distress signal is activated using a switch usually installed near the bus driver and out of sight of the passengers. It is connected directly to the Control Console by a single-wire cable.

The operator simply has to activate the switch and all the Destination Signs of the system display the programmed distress message for example "HELP CALL 911". This prompts passers-by to call for help on behalf of the operator and allows emergency services to easily identify the vehicle needing assistance.

1.5. "YIELD" SIGNAL

The YIELD option is a signal the operator can activate. This signal displays a message to the vehicles following the bus requesting to give way to the bus. The yield signal is activated using a switch usually located by the operator. It is connected directly to the Control Console by a single-wire cable.

The operator simply has to activate the switch to display the "YIELD" message on the Rear sign for a configurable minimum delay or as long as the signal is activated.

SECTION 2

2. INSTALLATION

2.1. MECHANICAL INSTALLATION

This section explains how to install the components of the sign system. *Failure to adhere to the proper installation procedures may translate into high repair costs due to breakage or failures and voids the warranty*. Only skilled technicians should install this system. All the precautions mentioned in this manual must be followed and all safety regulations of the vehicle OEM and/or your Transit Authority must be adhered to.

2.1.1. CONTROL CONSOLE INSTALLATION

The Control Console is the interface between the operator and the EDSS. It must be positioned in a location easily accessible and readable without creating a nuisance for the operator. The Control Console has been designed for recessed installation. It is necessary to cut a hole on a flat surface at the selected location (See Section 6.7). Follow all precautionary measures mentioned in this manual and adhere to all safety regulations of the vehicle OEM and/or your Transit Authority.

2.1.2. INTERIOR SIGNS INSTALLATION

The signs must be installed as per the following recommendations depending on their location:

- The Front Destination Sign is located in the compartment above the operator cab and facing outside.
- The Curb Side Sign is located inside the vehicle, on the first curb side window (right side of the vehicle), facing outside, and adjacent to the door.
- The Route Side Sign is located inside the vehicle, on the first route side window (left side of the vehicle).
- The Key Number Sign is located on the dashboard of the vehicle, facing outside. It is positioned on the right side of the vehicle to do not interfere with the field of view of the bus driver.

No matter the sign, it needs to be positioned as close as possible to the compartment window (between 6 mm ($\frac{1}{4}$ ") and 50 mm (2") for optimum performance. It may be vertically positioned or inclined by 10° maximum towards the ground. It must remain accessible from inside of the vehicle for maintenance. When installing, ensure:

- That display messages are fully visible from outside of the vehicle.
- To use mounting brackets matching those recommended for installation on a specific type of vehicle.
- That power cables connected to signs are properly secured to prevent stress on connector pins.
- To follow all precautionary measures mentioned in this manual and to adhere to all safety regulations of the vehicle OEM and/or your Transit Authority.

2.1.3. OUTSIDE REAR SIGN INSTALLATION

The Outside Rear Sign is mounted on the back panel of the vehicle. The sign must be recessed into the back panel (See Section 6.8). Simply cut a hole on a flat surface of the back panel to install it. When installing, ensure:

- To use mounting brackets matching those recommended for installation on a specific type of vehicle.
- That power cable connected to the rear sign is properly secured to prevent stress on connector pins.
- To follow all precautionary measures mentioned in this manual and to adhere to all safety regulations of the vehicle OEM and/or your Transit Authority.

2.1.4. DISTRESS SIGNAL SWITCH INSTALLATION

The momentary switch used to activate the Distress Signal has to be installed near the bus driver and out of sight of the passengers. The type of switch and its final location are left to the manufacturer and/or the Transit Authority's preference.

2.1.5. YIELD SWITCH INSTALLATION

The momentary switch used to activate the YIELD signal has to be installed near the bus driver. The type of switch and its final location are left to the manufacturer and/or the Transit Authority's preference.

2.2. ELECTRICAL INTERCONNECTION

This section describes the procedure to interconnect all components of the EDSS. *Failure to adhere to this procedure may translate into major repair costs due to breakage or failures and voids the warranty*. Follow all the precautions mentioned in this manual and adhere to all safety regulations of the vehicle OEM and/or your Transit Authority.

NOTE Ensure to *TURN OFF* the bus power supply prior to connecting or disconnecting components.

The power supply of the EDSS is 9-36 Vdc. Figure 1 is a simplified diagram offering a bird's eye view of the location of the system components on the vehicle.



Figure 1: System Components Interconnection and Location

Figure 34: Electrical Interconnection in Section 6.1 shows a detailed view of the system components interconnection. It shows the types of connectors and cables used including a definition for each of the signals of these different cables.

The following paragraphs describe in detail each of the different cables used to interconnect system components.

2.2.1. MAIN POWER CABLE

The main power cable is made up of three (3) or four (4) wires:

- BATT+
- GND
- IGN
- ACC (optional)



Figure 2: Main Power Cable Connection

NOTE

Main power cable is supplied by the bus manufacturer. This cable must meet the specifications in the following paragraphs.

2.2.1.1. BATT+ Wire

The BATT+ wire is typically connected to the battery through a circuit breaker or fuse capable of withstanding the power requirements of your system configuration (see Table 5: Fuse Value According to Sign Model, Section 7.2) This power source is always live on the system. The BATT+ wire is connected to the power connector located on the Back Plate of the Front Destination Sign. The minimum rating of this wire is 12 AWG.

2.2.1.2. GND Wire

The GND wire must be connected to the vehicle mass. The GND wire is connected to the power connector located on the Back Plate of the Front Destination Sign. The minimum rating of this wire is 12 AWG.

2.2.1.3. IGN Wire

The IGN wire must be connected to a 9-36 Vdc source that is activated when the Master Coach Run Switch of the vehicle is turned on. The power signal is supplied by the Master Coach Run Switch in all of its positions except for "OFF" and commands the Control Console to turn the EDSS on. The IGN wire is connected to the power connector located on the Back Plate of the Front Destination Sign. The minimum rating of this wire is 18 AWG.

2.2.1.4. ACC Wire

The ACC wire is **optional**. When used, it must be connected to a 9-36 Vdc source activated by a device other than the Master Coach Run Switch of the vehicle. The supplied power signal commands the Control Console to turn the EDSS on. The ACC wire is connected to the ACC screw of the terminal block located on the Back Plate of the Front Destination Sign using a #10 Ring Tongue terminal lug. The minimum rating of this wire is 18 AWG.

2.2.2. CONTROL CONSOLE POWER CABLE

The Control Console power cable connects the Console to the sign junction and other bus communication networks, if required. Also, this cable can connect the Distress Signal switch to the Control Console. There are various types of the power cable. The figures in Section 6.3 CONTROL CONSOLE CABLE show the different types of cables that can be used.

The Control Console power cable connects as follows:

- Connect the Control Console extension cable (9-pin connector) to the **CONSOLE** connector (9-pin connector) located on the Back Plate of the Front Destination Sign. (See Figure 3)
- Connect the other end of the Control Console extension cable (12-pin connector) to the corresponding connector located on the Control Console. (See Figure 3).



- Connect the distress signal switch wire to the bus distress switch. (See Figure 4).
 - If the Control Console power cable used is the one shown in Section 6.3.1, the power signal supplied by the distress switch must be a ground signal (GND).

- If the Control Console power cable used is the one shown in Sections 6.3.2 and 6.3.3, the power signal supplied by the distress switch must be a 9-36 Vdc signal.
- The distress switch is supplied and installed by the bus manufacturer.



Figure 4: Distress Switch Connection

- Connect the yield signal switch wire to the bus yield switch. (See Figure 6).
 - If the Control Console power cable used is the one shown in Section 6.3.1, the power signal supplied by the yield switch must be a ground signal (GND).
 - If the Control Console power cable used is the one shown in Sections 6.3.2 and 6.3.3, the power signal supplied by the yield switch must be a 9-36 Vdc signal.
 - The yield switch is supplied and installed by the bus manufacturer.



Figure 5: Yield Switch Connection

• If the cable used includes J1708-type connectors and/or RS-232-type connectors, contact the Customer Service of Axion Technologies Ltd., to get more information on how to connect these two connectors.

2.2.3. THE 802.11 b/g WI-FI MODULE ANTENNA CABLE FOR CONTROL CONSOLE

If the control console has a 802.11 b/g WI-FI module, secure the antenna cable to the SMAtype antenna connector (SMA female) on the back plate of the console.



Figure 6: Wi-Fi Module - Antenna Cable Connection

2.2.4. CURB SIDE SIGN POWER CABLE

The Curb Side Sign power cable connects the sign to the Front Sign junction. The power cable connects as follows:

- Connect the power cable (5-pin connector) to the CURB SIDE SIGN connector (5pin connector) located on the Back Plate of the Front Destination Sign. (See Figure 7)
- Connect power cable (4-pin connector) to the Curb Side Sign connector.

2.2.5. ROUTE SIDE SIGN POWER CABLE

The Route Side Sign power cable connects the sign to the Front Sign junction. The power cable connects as follows:

- Connect the power cable (5-pin connector) to the **ROUTE SIDE SIGN** connector (5pin connector) located on the Back Plate of the Front Destination Sign (See Figure 8).
- Connect the power cable (4-pin connector) to the Route Side Sign connector.

2.2.6. REAR SIGN POWER CABLE

The Rear Sign power cable connects the sign to the Front Sign junction. The power cable connects as follows:

- Connect the power cable (5-pin connector) to the **REAR SIGN** connector (5-pin connector) located on the Back Plate of the Front Destination Sign (See Figure 9).
- Connect the power cable (4-pin connector) to the Rear Sign connector.



2.2.7. KEY NUMBER SIGN POWER CABLE

The Key Number Sign power cable connects the sign to the Front Sign junction. The power cable connects as follows:

- Connect the power cable (5-pin connector) to the **KEY NUMBER SIGN** connector (5-pin connector) located on the Back Plate of the Front Sign. (See Figure 10).
- Connect the power cable (4-pin connector) to the Key Number Sign connector.

2.3. INSTALLATION FINAL CHECKS

Ensure that all components of the EDSS are properly attached mechanically and well secured to the bus structure. They should not interfere with the other systems of the vehicle nor should they be damaged by them. Close all access panels when finished.

2.4. POST-INSTALLATION FUNCTIONALITY TEST

This section presents the information required to start up the EDSS and check functionality of each of its components.

2.4.1. STEP 1: EDSS STARTUP

First, the Control Console displays the following information at startup:

AXION

OPTION NO: xxx

where "xxx" is the sign option number.

Second, the control Console displays the system configuration as follows:

FT: xx	SD: xx	RR: xx
RS: xx	KN: xx	NS: xx

where "xx" is the ID of the signs configured in the Control Console. At the first startup, there is no sign configured. The Control Console displays the following text.

CONFIG. NOT DEFINED

PRESS ANY KEY

Press Enter. The Control Console verifies the config present on the bus prior to continuing. Finally, the Control Console starts the test mode and displays the following information:

00001

TEST MODE

The test mode allows the signs to display messages in sequence to ensure they properly operate. The message sequence is as follows:

- Lit and unlit squares display alternately.
- Lit and unlit lines display alternately (one lit line every four lines).
- Axion logo.
- Sign dimensions in terms of number of lines and columns.

2.4.2. STEP 2: CONTROL CONSOLE CONFIGURATION

The configuration of the Control Console must correspond to that of the installed EDSS. Turn on the Control Console and verify that the LCD configuration corresponds to that of the system installed on the vehicle. Refer to Section 4.1.2 to find the configuration code interpretation. Entering Menu 09 of the Control Console (Section 4.1.9) also displays the configuration. If configurations do not match, you must reconfigure the network to make it functional (Section 4.1.9, Menu 1).

2.4.3. STEP 3: EMERGENCY SWITCH TEST (IF INSTALLED)

Check correct functioning of the Emergency Switch (If installed). Turn on Emergency Switch and check that signs display the distress signal. Enter "00" on the Control Console keypad to deactivate the emergency mode.

2.4.4. STEP 4: YIELD SWITCH TEST (IF INSTALLED)

Check correct functioning of the Yield Switch (If installed). Turn on momentarily Yield Switch and check that Rear sign displays the YIELD message for at least 12 seconds.

2.4.5. STEP 5: OFF DELAY FUNCTIONALITY TEST

Check correct functioning of the OFF delay. The factory programmed value is one minute. Follow the following steps:

- Turn off the Master Run Switch of the bus.
- Wait for one minute to confirm that the EDSS turns off.

2.4.6. STEP 6: PHOTOSENSOR LIGHT INTENSITY CONTROL

Enter Menu 15 of the Control Console (Section 4.1.9). Every sign displays a number corresponding to its current intensity level. Check correct functioning of the light intensity control by blocking or allowing light to the sensor. The Destination Sign decreases/increases light intensity accordingly. Otherwise, refer to Section 5.1.3 to find the cause.

SECTION 3

3. MAINTENANCE

This section provides the information required for the proper maintenance of your EDSS. We strongly recommend that you keep written records of every fault and repair. Note, on each occasion, the serial number of the defective assembly (ID plate on back of each assembly).

Your written records will be a good fault finding tool for future troubleshooting.

3.1. TEST EQUIPMENT

With the exception of the database transfers to a PTU or USB key requiring a PC, no special test equipment is needed to perform maintenance on the system other than the tools usually found at a technician's bench.

3.2. CLEANING

3.2.1. SIGN CLEANING



The different components of the EDSS can be cleaned with a moist towel. We recommend the use of a mild soap for the casing and a domestic glass cleaner for the acrylic window of the outside Rear Sign. Do not use highly concentrated solvents that would damage the acrylic window.

3.2.2. FUSE REPLACEMENT

- Turn off sign power supply.
- Open the Back Plate of the Front Destination Sign.
- Locate the faulty fuse and replace it with a new one of the same specifications. (See Figure 11: Fuse Definition).

SECTION 4

4. EDSS OPERATION

The operation of the EDSS is very simple. This section presents the various available functions of the EDSS.

4.1. USE OF THE CONTROL CONSOLE

4.1.1. INTRODUCTION TO THE USER INTERFACE

Management of EDSS is performed through the Control Console user interface. The following figure and table show the Control Console user interface and the definitions of its keypad.

4.1.2. STARTUP OF THE CONTROL CONSOLE

At startup, the Control Console displays different messages allowing the user to validate the Control Console configuration. The first message to be displayed is the company name followed by the number of the option chosen at the time you bought your Control Console. This number must match the number at the back of the Control Console and/or the number of the option chosen at the time of purchase. Otherwise, contact Axion Technologies Ltd., Customer Service.

The second message to be displayed is the sign network configuration programmed in the Control Console.

The Control Console must be configured properly to have an operational EDSS. The Control Console is delivered pre-configured. To verify that the configuration corresponds to that of your signs system, look carefully at the LCD on your Control Console to see if the configuration displayed at power-up corresponds to that installed on the vehicle.

The following figure shows an example of configuration displayed on the LCD.

The above example corresponds to the following configuration:

FT :76	Front Sign (FT) 16x160, 1-LED
SD :7C	Curb Side Sign (SD) 8x96, 1-LED
RR :79	Rear Sign (RR) 16x48, 1-LED

If there are no IP, A1 or A2 signs, the second figure does not display at startup.

Refer to Section 7.1 to find the sign identification codes.

If the displayed configuration matches the one installed on the bus, the EDSS is ready to operate. Otherwise, you must reconfigure the Console. Refer to Section 4.1.9 for specific instructions.

4.1.3. ENTERING A ROUTE

- Consult your Transit Authority code list.
- Using the alphanumeric keyboard of the Control Console, select and enter the code for the route to be displayed.
- Press ENTER to validate your choice.

When the route is entered, the Control Console LCD displays the following information:

- Route number is displayed in the upper left corner of the LCD.
- Route content (message) is displayed on the second line of the LCD. If this is a multiline route, the lines display alternately depending on the time interval set at database programming.

NOTE Verify that all of the Signs display the correct information.

4.1.4. ENTERING A PUBLIC MESSAGE

- Consult your Transit Authority code list for the public service announcement to be displayed.
- Press PUBLIC MESSAGE on the Control Console keypad.
- Using the Control Console alphanumeric keypad, select and enter the code for the public message to be added to the route displayed by your signs. Depending on the option chosen (See Section 4.1.9), the entering of a public message number may be protected by a password. This option is deactivated when the console leaves the factory. On the other hand, if the password is required and you have forgotten it, you can enter the hardcoded value "9595".
- Press ENTER to confirm your choice.

When the message is entered, the Control Console LCD displays the following information:

- Route number and public service announcement number are displayed in the upper left corner of the LCD.
- Route content (message) and public service announcement display alternately on the second line. If this is a multiline route and/or public service announcement, the lines display alternately depending on the time interval set at database programming.

NOTE Verify that all of the Signs display the correct information.

• To deactivate the display of the public service announcement, follow the above steps and enter "00" as public message number.

4.1.5. ENTERING TEXT FOR KEY NUMBER SIGN

- Press KEY NUMBER twice on the Control Console keypad.
- Using the Control Console alphanumeric keypad and the cursor arrows (to get letters I to Z), select and enter the text to be displayed by the Key Number Sign (Four characters maximum can be displayed.)
- Press ENTER to confirm your choice.
- When the text is entered, the Control Console LCD displays the following information:

• Route number and Key Number text message are displayed in the upper left corner of the LCD.

• Route content (message) is displayed on the second line. If this a multiline route, the lines display alternately depending on the time interval set at database programming.

NOTE

Verify that Key Number Sign displays the correct information.

• To deactivate the display of the text on the Key Number Sign, repeat the above steps and enter "0" as text to be displayed.

4.1.6. PROGRAM AND RECALL ROUTE USING THE DEST A and DEST B KEYBUTTONS

"DEST A" and "DEST B" keys allow storage of two route numbers. When programmed, these routes may be recalled by pressing "DEST A" and DEST B" keys. To program, proceed as follows:

- Using the Control Console alphanumeric keypad, select and enter the code for the route to be associated with the DEST A or DEST B key buttons.
- Press the DEST A or DEST B key buttons to confirm your choice.
- To recall the route associated with DEST A or DEST B, simply press the DEST A or DEST B key buttons on the Control Console to bring up its associated route number.

NOTE

Some Control Consoles are preprogrammed to execute an automatic "ENTER" when pressing a letter or following the entering of the 4th digit of the route number. Therefore, to program the route number of these consoles using the DEST A and DEST B key buttons, do not enter a four-digit route number or a route number including a letter.

4.1.7. USING THE BACKLIGHT KEYBUTTON

The Backlight key button sets the intensify level of the Control Console LCD. There are three intensity levels. To set the level, press successively the Backlight key button until the desired intensity level is obtained.

4.1.8. USING THE ERASE KEYBUTTON

The ERASE key button deletes or cancels the last entry on the Control Console.

During power-up of the bus, you can press the ERASE key to bypass the reading of the YIELD and distress signals and the autorouting function.

4.1.9. USING THE FUNCTIONS AVAILABLE THROUGH THE MENUS KEYBUTTON

The Control Console has several functions which can be set or selected using the MENUS key button. Use the " \hat{U} " or " $\hat{\Psi}$ " key buttons to scroll down and up the menus or enter the menu number on the numeric keypad. Activation of the menu function is protected by a password. This password is factory programmed "1234" as default value. It can be modified at any time.

If you have forgotten the password giving access to the menus of the Control Console, you can enter the hardcoded value "9595" any time.

4.2. ERROR CODE INTERPRETATION FOR MENU 13

4.2.1. COMMUNICATION ERROR ("E" SYMBOL)

The communication error shows that the Control Console fails to transfer information at least to one module of the EDSS. Location of the flashing "E" letter on the LCD shows which sign is faulty. The following figure shows an example of a communication error on the Rear Sign.

4.2.2. LINE OF PRODUCTS ERROR ("G" SYMBOL)

This error notifies the user that the sign present on the network is not recognized by the Control Console. The fault is identified by a flashing "G" on the LCD. Location of the "G" letter shows which of the signs is not recognized. The following figure shows an example of the line of products error on the Rear Sign.

4.2.3. IDENTITY ERROR ("I" SYMBOL)

This error notifies the user that the identity of the sign present on the network does not match that of the sign configured in the Control Console. The fault is identified by a flashing "I" on the LCD. Location of the "I" letter shows which of the signs differs from the one configured. The following figure shows an example of the identity error on the Rear Sign.

4.2.4. DATABASE INCOMPATIBILITY ERROR ("D" SYMBOL)

The database error notifies the user that the database configuration does not match that of the sign network preprogrammed in the Control Console. The fault is displayed at the Control Console startup. The message on the LCD reads as follows:

CONFIGURATION DIFFER FROM DATABASE

Then, the Control Console operates normally. When activating Menu 13, the location of the "D" letter shows which of the signs have a database different from that configured in the Control Console. The following figure shows an example of database incompatibility error on the Rear Sign.

4.2.5. PHOTOSENSOR ERROR ("P" SYMBOL)

The photosensor error shows that the photosensor of one or more signs is faulty. LED intensity cannot change according to ambient light conditions. Faulty sign(s) displays (display) on the Control Console LCD. Location of the flashing "P" letter shows which of the signs are faulty. The following figure shows an example of photosensor error on the Rear Sign.

4.2.6. OPERATING FREQUENCY ERROR ("C" SYMBOL)

This error shows that the operating frequency of one or more signs differs from that of the Control Console. Faulty sign(s) displays (display) on the Control Console LCD. Location of the flashing "C" letter shows which of the signs are faulty. The following figure shows an example of the operating frequency error on the Rear Sign.

4.2.7. ERROR PRIORITY

The errors present on sign network have a display priority. If a sign has more than one error code, only one shows at a time. In the order, the display priority of error codes is as follows:

Priority	Error	Code
1	Communication error	E
2	Line of products error	G
3	Identity error	I
4	Database incompatibility error	D
5	Photosensor error	Р
6	Operating frequency error	С

The error code is updated every 18 seconds maximum to reflect the current state of the sign network.

4.3. DATABASE TRANSFER

The database must be preprogrammed using a computer (IBM PC or compatible) running the "DataTransit" software. Each message is attributed a route code that the operators enter on the Control Console for related information to be displayed.

When your database is complete, transfer it from the computer to a PTU or USB key. Download the database to the vehicle console using a PTU, a USB key or the WI-FI link using one of the methods described in the following sections.

4.3.1. TRANSFER USING THE PORTABLE TRANSFER UNIT (PTU)

Download database to vehicle using the PTU plugged into the connector located on the Control Console.

To download data to the Control Console, the PTU must be preprogrammed using the Data Transit Software. Refer to Data Transfer Software User Guide entitled <u>Route Management</u> <u>Software for Electronic Destination Sign Systems</u> for more information on the PTU programming procedure.



When programmed, the database may be downloaded to the Control Console. To do so, proceed as follows:

4.3.2. TRANSFER USING THE UNIVERSAL SERIAL BUS (USB) KEY

Database downloading to the vehicle may be performed using a USB key inserted into the Control Console USB slot.

To download data to the Control Console, the USB key must be preprogrammed using the Data Transit Software. Refer to Data Transfer Software User Guide entitled <u>Route</u> <u>Management Software for Electronic Destination Sign Systems</u> for more information on the USB key programming procedure.

When programmed, database may be downloaded to the Control Console. To do so, proceed as follows:

STANDARD PROCEDURE TO TRANSFER DATABASE TO THE CONTROL CONSOLE USING A USB KEY

Insert USB key into the slot on the front of the Control Console.

- The message: "COPYING FROM USB DO NOT REMOVE!" appears on the LCD to indicate that transfer is under way.

4.3.3. TRANSFER USING THE WIRLESS FIDELITY(WIFI)

Database downloading to the vehicle is processed automatically without user intervention except for the downloading of the database on the WIFI router.

Also, database downloading to the vehicle may be forced using wireless fidelity regardless of the database ID.
